In 2001 the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Administration identified the following responses of elders to disaster situations:

- **1. Sensory Deprivation** Sense of smell, touch, vision and hearing may be less acute hard to hear what is said in a noisy environment, or smell rotted food.
- **2. Delayed Response Syndrome** Seniors don't react as fast, may need to keep disaster application centers open longer.
- **3. Generational Values** how and what services are acceptable may be different depending on the generation, attitudes towards accepting help, etc.
- **4. Chronic Illness And Medications** conditions such as arthritis make it harder to stand in long lines for services. Medications may cause confusion. Dehydration is an issue.
- **5. Memory Disorders** seniors may not remember directions or information.
- **6. Transfer Trauma** frail elders dislocated without adequate support could cause illness or death.
- **7. Multiple Loss Effect** loss of spouse, income, home, physical abilities, compound each others, makes recovery more challenging.
- **8. Hyper/Hypothermia** seniors are often more susceptive to the effects of heat or cold.
- **9. Crime Victimization** con artists target the elderly particularly in a disaster. These issues need to be addressed in shelters/
- **10. Unfamiliarity With Bureaucracy** especially seniors who have not had experience working through a red tape system. Especially true of older women whose spouse may have handled a lot of paperwork.
- **11. Literacy** those with lower educational achievement harder to understand and complete applications or follow complicated directions.
- **12. Language And Cultural Barriers** –command of English, understanding authority figures, American systems and expectation,

trusting police, etc. This also means that police and other authority figures may lose patience and interpret cultural difference as noncompliance.

- **13. Mobility Impariments** just getting around, driving, use of public transportation, ability to carry supplies.
- **14. Welfare Stigma** Many elders are adverse to accepting welfare or help.
- **15. Mental Health Stigma** feelings of shame may prevent elders or their families from reporting mental health issues during a disaster.
- **16.** Loss Of Independence many fear the loss of independence if they ask for help. Fear of being placed in a nursing home may be a barrier.
