## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO A COMPREHENSIVE FAMILY CAREGIVER ASSSITANCE PROGRAM.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE SILVER LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I. INTRODUCTION
2	SECTION 1. The Silver Legislature finds that significant
3	changes in Medicare and Medicaid health insurance programs
4	nationally and locally will impose greater responsibilities upon
5	individuals and families to be well-informed and astute about long-
6	term care planning, financing, and the options available to assist
7	them.
8	Additionally, Hawaii is facing a growing healthcare worker
9	shortage, while at the same time health and long-term care needs
10	continue to rise. As a result of cost-containment policies and
11	practices, people with healthcare needs are being discharged from
12	hospitals and other care facilities with complex healthcare
13	requirements while facing reduced home- and community-based care
14	options. This puts the responsibility on families, who are
15	inadequately prepared and trained, to provide such care.
16	Furthermore, the caregiving tradition in Hawaii is, over time,
17	challenged by the changes in Hawaii demographics: birth rates,
18	marriages, single-occupant households, high costs of living, and
19	family members working outside the home or moving away from Hawaii.
20	By 2020, more than one in four individuals will be sixty years
21	old or older. The need for personal care due to physical, sensory,
22	cognitive, and self-care disabilities increases with age. As
23	Hawaii's population ages, many more families will be providing

- 1 higher levels of long-term care to frail and disabled older adults2 at home.
- Finally, Hawaii's long-term care system is on a collision
- 4 course with the day-to-day reality of families coping with caring
- 5 for loved ones with chronic conditions. Without attention to this
- 6 situation, the \$875 million in unpaid supportive services provided
- 7 by Hawaii's family caregivers may well be jeopardized when these
- 8 caregivers suffer from the costs that impede their ability to give
- 9 care. As this pattern plays itself out, the quality of care
- 10 provided to the frail elderly and individuals with disabling or
- 11 chronic conditions will diminish, and the costs to Hawaii's long-
- 12 term care system will skyrocket.
- 13 The purpose of this Act is to provide assistance to family
- 14 caregivers who provide at-home care for their elderly relatives.
- 15 PART II. HAWAII FAMILY CAREGIVER GRANT PROGRAM
- 16 SECTION 2. There is established a Hawaii Family Caregiver Grant
- 17 Program to provide annual grants of up to \$1,000 to family
- 18 caregivers who provide unreimbursed care to a relative. The
- 19 following general requirements shall apply:
- 20 (1) Both the caregiver and the relative receiving care must be21 related by blood, marriage, or adoption.
- 22 (2) Both the caregiver and the relative receiving care must reside in Hawaii.
- 24 (3) A licensed physician must certify that the criteria for 25 assistance are met.
- (4) Applications must contain an original signature from thecaregiver and the physician who provides certification.
- 28 The following caregiver requirements shall apply:
- 29 (1) Provide unreimbursed (unpaid) care for a relative who has a 30 mental or physical impairment.
- 31 (2) Have an annual Hawaii adjusted gross income of not more than \$50,000.

- 1 (3) Provide care to the relative for at least six months of the 2 previous calendar year. 3 The following relative receiving care requirements shall apply: 4 Require assistance with two or more of the following: eating, dressing, bathing, toileting, transferring, bowel continence, 5 and bladder continence. 6 7 (2) Require assistance for at least six months out of the 8 previous calendar year. 9 Not be receiving Medicaid-reimbursed long-term care services, (3) **10** except on a periodic or temporary basis. 11 PART III. COORDINATION OF STATEWIDE FAMILY CAREGIVER SUPPORT 12 SERVICES AND POLICIES 13 SECTION 3. The Executive Office on Aging (EOA) shall 14 coordinate public and private sector organizations and family 15 caregivers to establish: 16 A one-stop, single entry access point into the long-term care **17** system and family caregiver support; 18 New partnerships to address the needs of family caregivers; (2) 19 (3) Greater coordination and support for grandparents and other 20 relatives who are raising children. 21 PART IV. RESPITE SERVICES 22 SECTION 4. The Departments of Health (DOH) and Human Services 23 (DHS) shall develop respite services for family caregivers so that 24 families can receive time off from their 24-hour service to have 25 regular breaks from their caregiving duties. Respite services shall be based on the DOH's Developmental Disabilities Division respite 26 27 program. 28 PART V. TRAINING AND EDUCATION 29 SECTION 5. There is established a training and education **30** program to:
- 31 (1) Increase the quality and quantity of long-term care workers;
- 32 (2) Improve the support and training of family caregivers in33 areas such as lifting, transporting, CPR, bathing, learning

- to deal with loves ones with dementia, psychological skillsand emotional support, and communication skills;
- 3 (3) Promote active aging to enhance the lives of seniors; and
- 4 (4) Develop certification standards for nurses aides.
- 5 PART VI. FAMILY CAREGIVER TAX CREDIT
- 6 SECTION 6. There is established a refundable \$1,000 Family
- 7 Caregiver Tax Credit for families who care for a family member at
- 8 home, who is categorized as needing help in two of the activities of
- 9 daily living, following procedure for granting tax credits for low
- 10 income people.
- 11 PART VII. CASH AND COUNSELING
- 12 SECTION 7. The Departments of Health (DOH) and Human Services
- 13 (DHS) shall develop a Cash and Counseling system of providing
- 14 financial assistance to family caregivers that combines elements of
- 15 financial support with direct services to help consumer make
- 16 informed choices about long-term care.
- 17 PART VIII. CONCLUSION
- 18 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the General Revenues
- 19 \$4 million for the purposes of this Act.
- 20 SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2006.
